**Heidelberg University Examination Rules and Regulations for the
Bachelor's Degree Programme
– Specific Section –
in East European and East-Central European Studies**

of 26 March 2015

On the basis of section 32 of the Act on Higher Education of the Land of Baden-Württemberg (Landeshochschulgesetz – LHG), last amended by the Third Act on the Amendment of Higher Education Law Provisions (Drittes Hochschulrechtsänderungsgesetz – 3. HRÄG) of 1 April 2014 (Official Register (Gesetzblatt - Gbl.) of 8 April 2014, p.99), the senate resolved the following examination rules and regulations - Specific Section - for the Bachelor's degree programme in East European and East-Central European studies of 1 June 2010 (President's Bulletin dated 21 June 2010, p. 499) on 24 March 2015.

The President gave his consent on 26 March 2015.

§ 1 Applicability of the General Section

The Heidelberg University examination rules and regulations for the Bachelor's programmes in modern languages and literature studies at the Faculty of Modern Languages - General Section -, as amended, form an integral part of these examination rules and regulations.

§ 2 Subject of the academic programme

- (1) The Bachelor's degree programme in East European and East-Central European studies deals in an interdisciplinary context with the languages, literatures, cultures, and history of the "East European/East-Central European" region, which is specified as the Russian, Polish, Czech, Croatian/Serbian and Bulgarian language areas. In the major subject (subject accounting for 75% of degree) and 1st and 2nd major subjects (subject accounting for 50% of degree), the degree programme focuses on extensive training and education in two of the aforementioned Slavic languages (one language for minor subject students, 25% of subject accounting for degree) on the one hand and on acquiring fundamental methods pertaining to philology, history and cultural studies, which enable students to analyse and place in context historical, social, cultural, and political phenomena in East or East-Central Europe. By acquiring, inter alia, interdisciplinary skills preparing them for professional careers, students learn to explore regional issues from a multidisciplinary perspective and present them appropriately.
The degree programme thus qualifies successful graduates to either pursue specialised master's degree programmes in Slavic studies and related

philologies, history, cultural and regional studies etc., or to embark on careers in positions of responsibility in the fields of politics and political consulting, social policy and social work, foreign services and international organisations, non-governmental organisations, culture, tourism, planning and administration at municipal and government level, media, adult education, the publishing and library sector, and academic institutions.

§ 3 Programme structure and possible combinations

- (1) The academic programme is structured in accordance with § 3 para. 2 of the General Section of the Bachelor's examination rules and regulations of the Faculty of Modern Languages. The required modules and corresponding courses are listed in Annex 1.
- (2) Heidelberg University offers the degree programme in East European and East-Central European studies as a major subject accounting for 75% (113 CP) of the degree, as a 1st or 2nd major subject accounting for 50% (74 CP) of the degree, and as a minor subject accounting for 25% (35 CP) of the degree.
- (3) The academic programme is composed of an introductory stage (1st and 2nd semester), an advanced stage (3rd and 4th semester) as well as a specialised stage (5th and 6th semester) and comprises the modules and their affiliated courses set forth under Annex 1. Within these stages, the programme is split into three different areas respectively: Language acquisition, scholarship and research, and interdisciplinary skills.
- (4) The major subject (75% option) comprises a total of 12 modules, with 6 of them allocated for language training, 5 for academic training and 1 examination module. The 1st and 2nd major subject (50% option) comprises a total of 7 modules, 4 of them allocated for language training and 3 for academic training. The minor subject (25% option) comprises 4 modules, 3 of them for language training and 1 for scholarship and research training. The examination module consists of a three-hour written examination (5 CP), and is to be completed in the major subject (75%) only. Additionally, major subject (75%) and 1st major subject (50% option) students will write a Bachelor's thesis (12 CP).
- (5) Major (75% option) and 1st and 2nd major subject students must choose 2 of the languages set forth under § 2 para. 1. Minor subject students (25% option) must select one language. Minor subject students (25% option) may choose between Russian, Polish or Czech only; major subject students must combine Russian with another Slavic language.
In the major (75% option) and minor (25% option) subject, the modules for language acquisition extend over all three stages of the Bachelor's degree programme; in the 1st and 2nd major subject, language acquisition covers only the introductory and advanced stages. For the scholarship and research modules, major (75%) students must complete two introductory modules in philology and history while 1st and 2nd major (50% option) students must only

the complete the linguistics and literary studies basic module. During the advanced stage, major subject (75% option) students may choose between a linguistics and a literary studies module with a cultural studies component, respectively; 1st and 2nd major subject (50% option) students must complete a condensed history basic module during this stage. In addition to the range of courses offered by the two subjects studied as part of the degree programme, both history and cultural studies-related modules offer the possibility to import teaching from related disciplines during the advanced and specialised stages, depending on the availability and willingness of the departments in question. This includes in particular related disciplines such as philologies, political, economic and social studies, art studies and musicology, and law. The course topic must clearly relate to East and East-Central European issues and students must obtain approval by the responsible departmental advisor or module coordinator prior to attendance. In addition to the extensive language training, the advanced stage of the minor subject (25% option) contains a module in history or cultural studies. The BA thesis and written examination in the major subject (75% option) cover the curriculum of the advanced stage scholarship and research modules. If a student chooses a topic from the history and cultural studies module for his or her BA thesis, the written examination will cover a topic from the curriculum of the linguistics or literary studies module with a cultural studies related component, and vice versa. In the 1st major subject (50% option), the topic of the BA thesis pertains to the course content of the main seminar on East or East-Central European history in the advanced module History – Language – Culture.

- (6) The orientation examination is held during the course of study. For majors (75% option) and 1st or 2nd majors (50% option), the examination consists of the successful completion of the scholarship and research basic module. In both introductory courses, successful completion requires sitting a 90-minute written examination, which must be graded "sufficient" (4.0) or better. For minors (25% option), the orientation examination consists of the successful completion of the language acquisition basic module.
- (7) Generally, courses and examinations are held in German; examinations and courses may however also be held in a Slavic language.
- (8) B2-level proficiency in English pursuant to the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages is required to complete the Bachelor's degree programme as a major subject (75% option), 1st and 2nd major subject (50% option) or minor subject (25% option). Proof of proficiency may be furnished by means of the university entrance qualification certificate (generally five years of school study) and/or equivalent certificates.
- (9) Generally, the subjects of the Bachelor's programmes may be freely combined, provided that corresponding programmes are offered. However, the Bachelor's degree programme in East and East-Central European studies may not be combined with a degree programme in Slavic studies or East European history.

§ 4 Requirements for admission to the Bachelor's examination

In accordance with § 13 para. 3 of the General Section, admission to the Bachelor's thesis requires the submission of additional certificates:

1. Proof of the award of 87 CP for the successful completion of the scholarship and research and language acquisition basic and advanced modules in the major subject (75% option), the award of 61 CP for the successful completion of the scholarship and research and language acquisition basic and advanced modules in the first major subject (50% option) as well as the successful completion of the main seminar of the specialised module.
2. Proof of English proficiency as stipulated under § 3 para. 8.

§ 5 Bachelor's thesis

- (1) The Bachelor's thesis is written in the one of the two sub-disciplines chosen as the student's special field.
- (2) The Bachelor's thesis must be written in German.

§ 6 Written final examination

- (1) The three-hour written final examination in the main subject (75% option) must be concluded within six weeks following the submission of the Bachelor's thesis or the last examination that was to be taken during the course of study, whichever of these two examination components was completed last. The examination date will be notified in due time. Failure to observe this date results in an "insufficient" (5.0) grade for the examination, unless the examinee is not responsible for such failure.
- (2) The subject matter covered by the examination pertains to the advanced phase module that has not been chosen for the Bachelor's thesis.
- (3) 5 credits are awarded for the corresponding work and study load.

§ 7 Calculation of the subject grade

- (1) To calculate the subject grade pursuant to § 19 of the General Section, all module grades of the introductory, advanced and specialised stages with the exception of the language acquisition basic modules are combined and weighted in proportion with their credits. To calculate the subject grade, the grade of the written final examination is weighted by a factor of 2.
- (2) The grade of the Bachelor's thesis is weighted by a factor of 2 for the calculation of the overall grade.

§ 8 Entry into force

(1) These examination rules and regulations become effective on the first day of the month following publication in the President's bulletin. Upon request, the examination rules and regulations in the version of 1 June 2010 (President's bulletin dated 21 June 2010, p.499) may be applied for six more semesters to students already enrolled in the Bachelor's degree programme in East European and East-Central European studies at Heidelberg University on this date.




